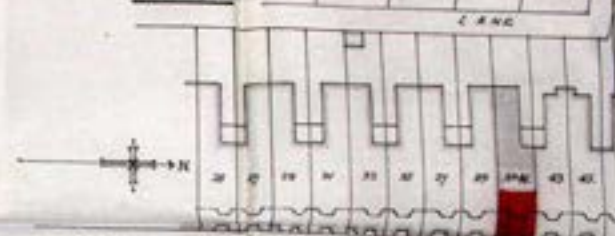

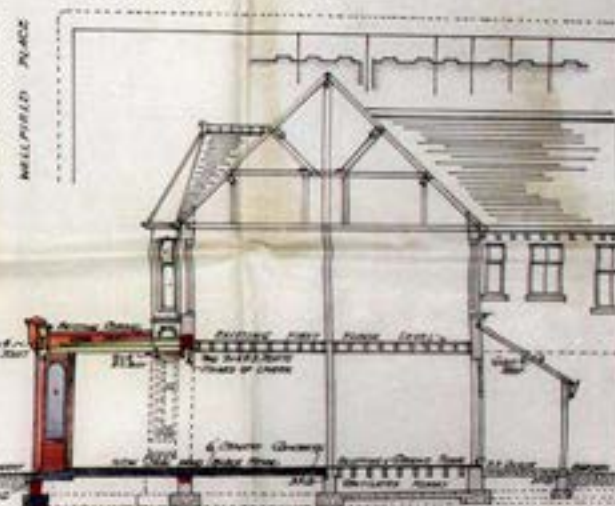

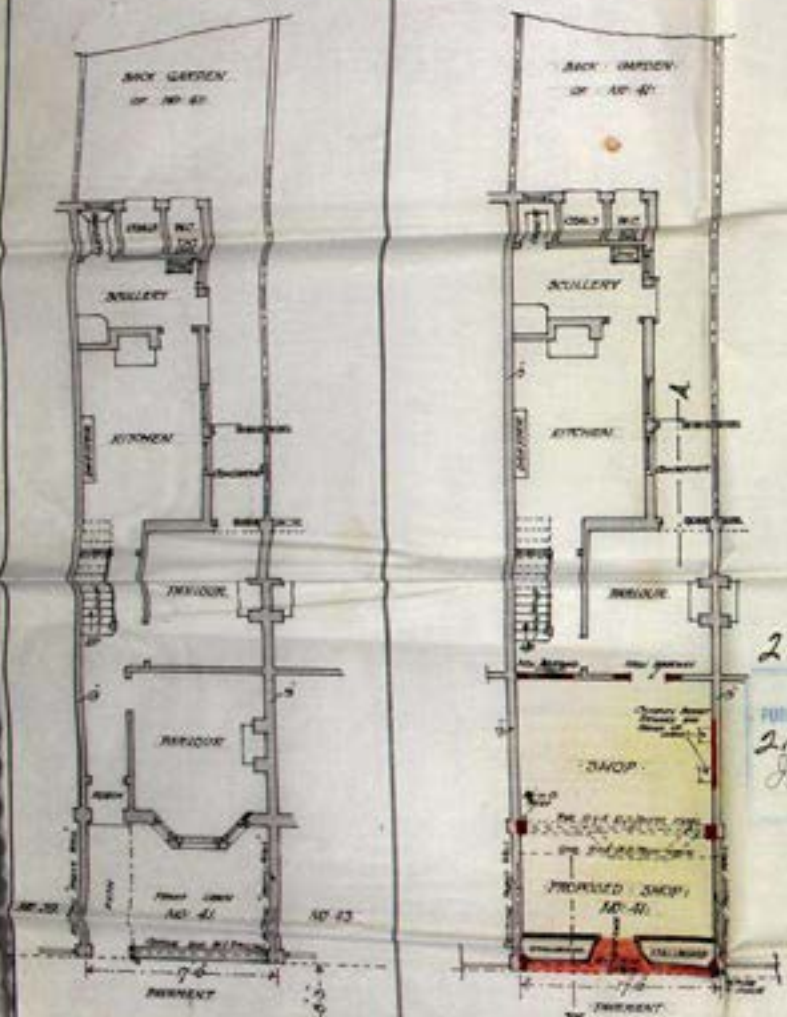

NO ALTERATIONS EXCEPT THAT SHOP OVER EXTENDED SHOP PORTION

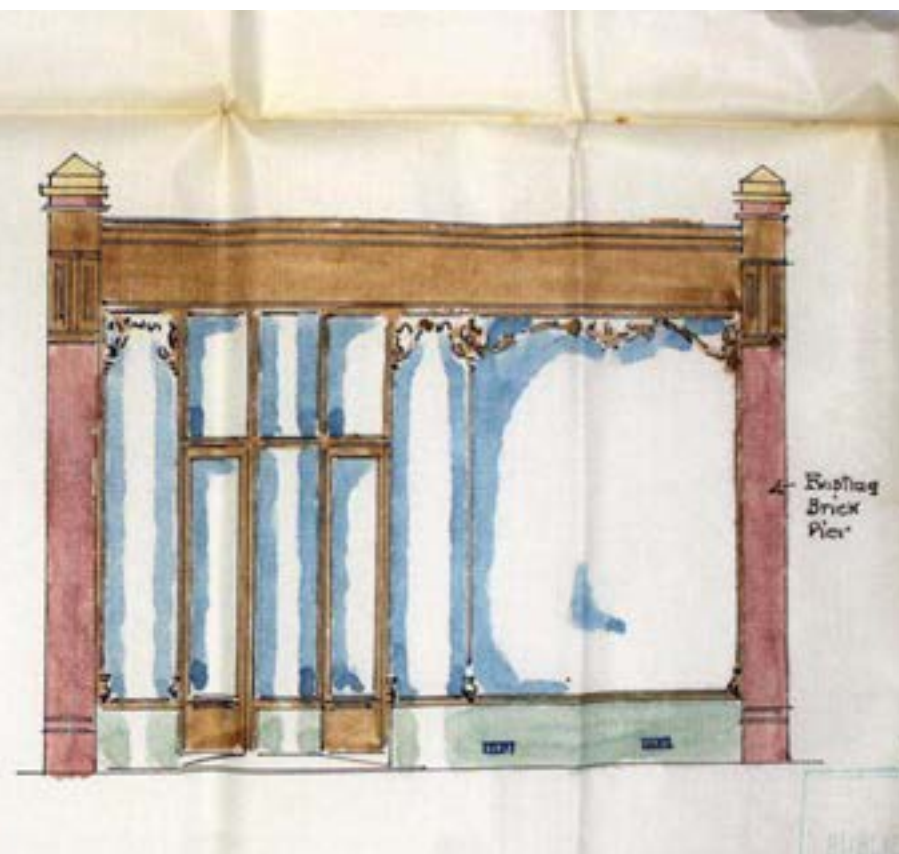
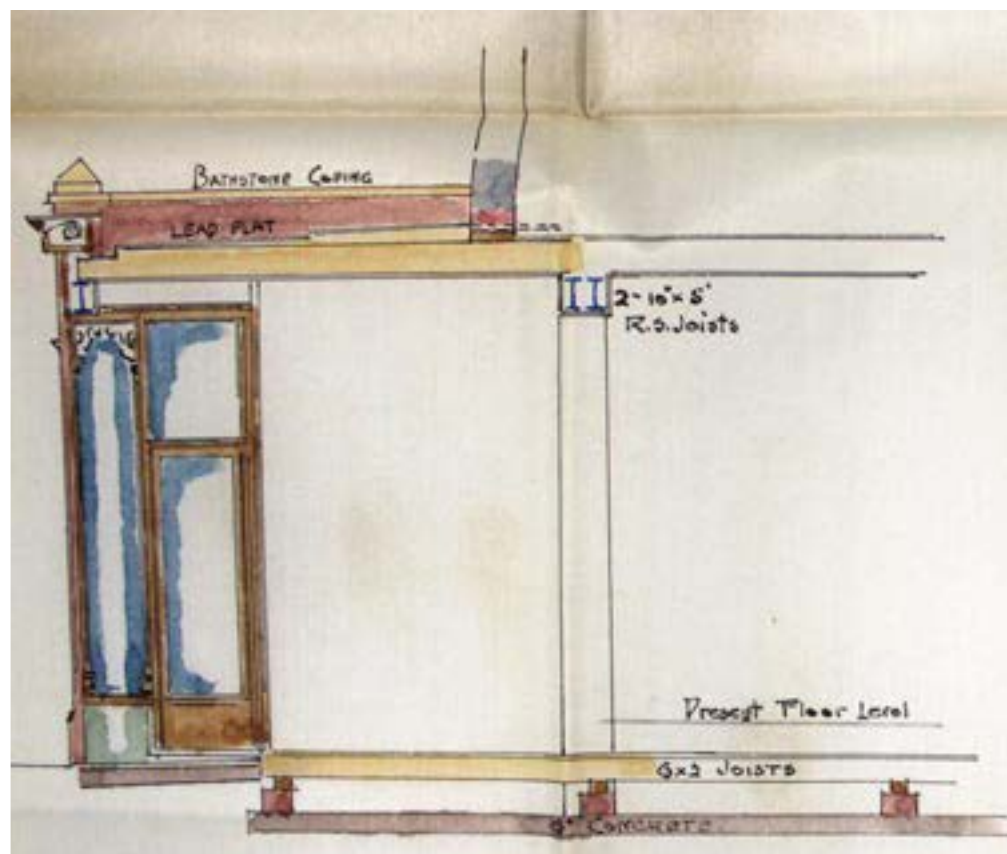
FIRST FLOOR PLAN

MARKET PORTERS

THE Public are respectfully informed that on and after SATURDAY next, the 15th of August, 1863, there will be in attendance at the CARDIFF MARKET HOUSE, from 9 o'clock a.m. until 6 p.m., several Lads from the "HAVANNAH" Ship TRAINING SCHOOL, to act as PORTERS.

Each Boy will be furnished with a Market Basket, a Plate, and suitable Cloths.

They may be engaged by the hour, half-hour, or by the single journey.

The Charges for their Services will be—

For every hour they may be engaged	- - -	Two Pence.
For every half-hour	- - -	One Penny.
A Single Journey from the Market House to any place not beyond the South Wales, Taff Vale, and Rhymney Railway Stations, or the Cardiff Arms		One Penny.
Beyond those Places, but not exceeding One Mile from the Market House		Two Pence.

Each Boy is supplied with Vouchers, denoting the Money paid to him, and he is required to deliver one to the Person by whom he is employed and paid.

The support of the Cardiff Families to this scheme, promoted for their accommodation, as well as the benefit of the boys, is most earnestly solicited.

The Police have directions to afford the little Messengers every protection and assistance.

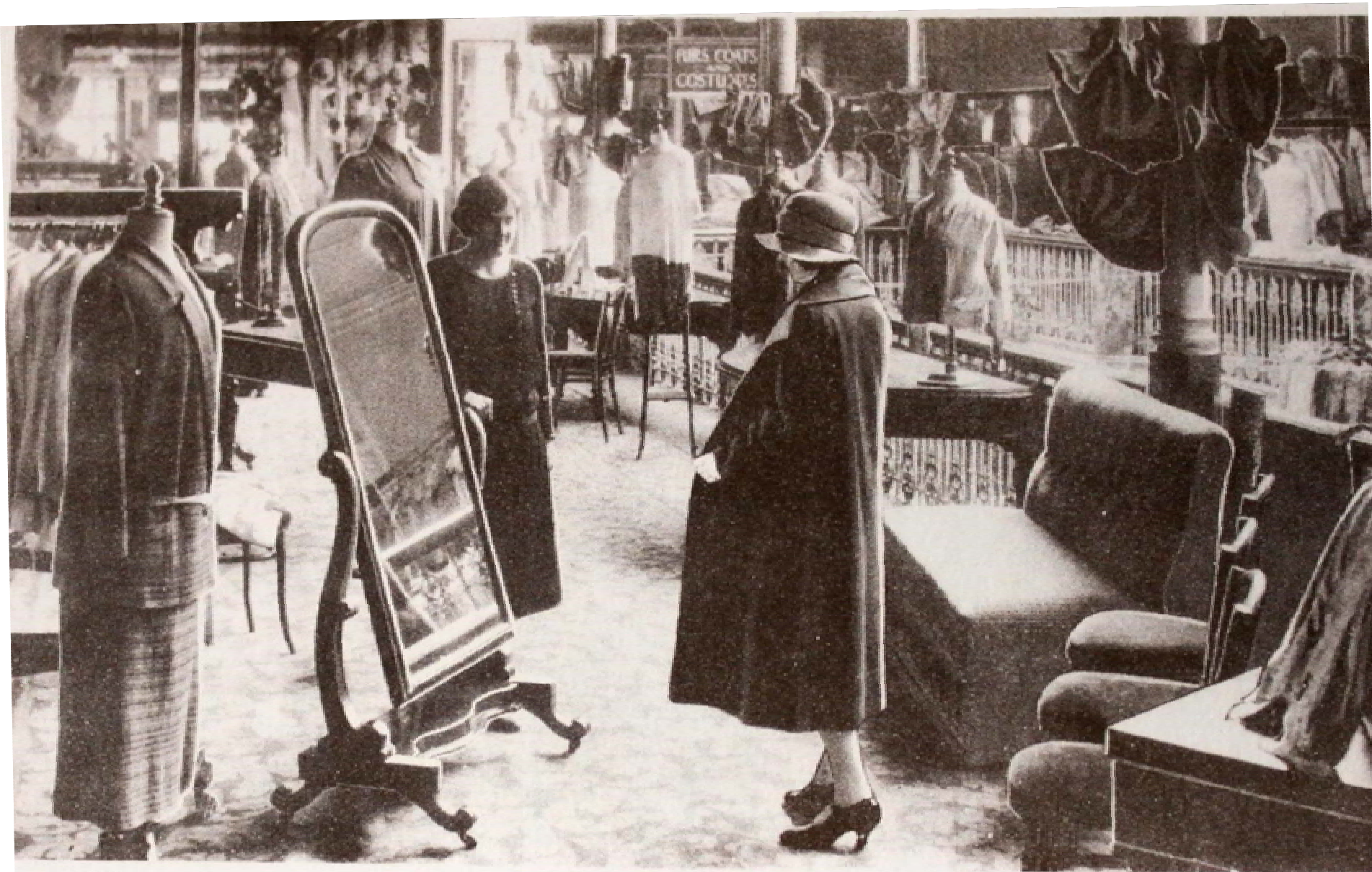

A box of Gifts from the British War Relief Society from America, was received today for distribution among the boys. The Gifts comprised boxes of sweets and games.

HORTICULTURAL COMMITTEES are to be set up in urban areas with populations of 20,000 and over. Represented on them will be (1) the Council; (2) any local horticultural society; (3) any local allotment society. The Horticultural Committee will

- (a) Encourage the production of food from allotments and private gardens.
- (b) Assist in indicating suitable land for additional allotments.
- (c) Provide expert advice where necessary.

EXISTING OWNERS OR OCCUPIERS of land which is not being fully cultivated are desired to assist Councils by putting land at their disposal, either free of rent, or at such agricultural rent as may be agreed.

SOME SUGGESTIONS

CULTIVATE your wartime allotment or garden on lines laid down in the Ministry's Bulletin *Food from the Garden* (3d. at your bookseller, or 3½d. post free from H.M. Stationery Office, Kingsway, London, W.C. 2).

REMEMBER that even the best soil needs adequate draining—natural or artificial. Dig and cultivate your land thoroughly; this will increase its fertility and make it possible to economise on fertilizers. But proper manuring—according to the requirements of your soil and crops—is essential to success.

DON'TS FOR DIGGERS

DON'T throw away or burn waste vegetation, but start a COMPOST HEAP with it. If treated as advised in the Bulletin it will prove a useful source of manure.

DON'T scrap all your choice flowers, plants, and rock garden if you are a gardener already. They may be difficult to replace after the war.

The schools in war-time

Memorandum No. 27

The Wild Fruit Crop

THE Ministry of Food is extremely anxious that the fullest possible use should be made of the blackberry crop this season, to make up for the poor crops of soft and stone fruit and to enable the preserves ration to be maintained at its present level. Other ripe fruit—bilberries, crab apples, elderberries, rowan berries, sloes—will also be available in some districts.

It is hoped that by organised local efforts all over the country some thousands of tons of blackberries and other wild fruit will be harvested. The Board hope that schools will play an active part in this effort. Many opportunities will occur, e.g., on nature study rambles and as a useful spare time occupation for children.

The fruit—for which, under the controlled price, the maximum of 3d. per lb. will be paid for blackberries and 2d. per lb. for crab apples—should be taken to the local fruit preservation centre. Schools organising blackberry picking should accordingly get in touch with their fruit preservation centre as soon as possible, to arrange where and when the fruit is to be delivered. If out of reach of a convenient centre or unaware of its address, they should apply to the Secretary of the County Federation of Women's Institutes (whose addresses are given overleaf), or to the Local Food Office.

Where schools have already made arrangements for disposing of the fruit they pick there is no need to upset these arrangements.

Where a school has facilities for making jam it can obtain sugar from the Local Food Office for preserving any fruit which its scholars have picked, and can retain the jam for consumption in the school outside the ration.

The following "points for pickers" should be kept in mind:—

Make sure you have the permission of the owner of the land. Overripe blackberries are unfit to travel.

Fruit picked immediately after rain will go mouldy and be useless for preserving.

Shut gates; be careful not to walk on crops; do not make gaps in hedges, and do not make fire near any hay rick or ripening corn, or on any dry heath or woodland.
